



## **A User's Guide to Online Research**

The Academic Directories and other Educational Resources provided on the Alliance's website should be your first stop for finding the information you need – whether it is for a research paper or simply to satisfy your own curiosity. The Academic Directories are a particularly rich resource. At present, they are available in three academic disciplines – Classics, History, and Literature – and more are coming soon. Each directory identifies high-quality, freely available academic resources on the Internet selected by academic experts.

If you cannot find what you are looking for on the Alliance's website – or if you need to conduct further research – this user's guide should help you find alternative sources of information. This document provides information about research resources that are generally available at many state, public, and college and university libraries. Access to such collections may require special arrangements.

Beyond that, this guide describes resources that are available to the alumni of Oxford, Stanford, and Yale Universities – the universities coordinating this project. Please note that most of those additional resources are restricted to graduates of these universities.

## Local, State, and Other Resources

Nearly everyone in the United States has access through local and state institutions to a wide array of printed and electronic information, including access to licensed online databases, professional reference services, and interlibrary loan services. Below, we have listed information about the different resources and services you might find at your local public library, state library, and neighboring college and university libraries.

### Library Services

This section describes the typical characteristics of different research institutions and details some of the useful services available at these libraries. Services and resources vary greatly from one institution to another, so always contact the library before visiting and find out if you are allowed to:

- Browse and/or borrow library materials
- Search electronic databases at the library or remotely
- Ask reference questions at the library or via telephone or email
- Borrow materials from other libraries through an interlibrary loan service

Of course, you should also ask any other specific questions you might have about using a library or its collections.

### Electronic Databases

As you do your research-and use the many informative Internet sites included in the Alliance's Academic Directories-you should also remember that there are many other important databases and electronic resources that you can access through your local public, state, or academic library. These databases may include full-text materials, images, and statistical data, in addition to important indexes and catalogs in any given field.

In many cases, you will need to visit a local, public, state or academic institution to access these resources, although some state and public libraries may actually provide these resources online to library card holders. Connecticut's ICONN project is an example of this:

### Local Public Libraries



Local public libraries provide open access and assistance to all users. Although large public libraries often contain major research collections, most free public library collections tend to be small and focused on general interest materials. Many of these libraries will provide some form of interlibrary loan services, which allows you to borrow materials that the library does not own. As discussed earlier, some libraries also make available useful electronic databases that can greatly facilitate your research.

Please refer to the section entitled “Find Your Local Libraries” to locate a local library. When you visit a library's website, look for "electronic resources," "electronic databases," or "digital library." Sometimes, the projects have unique names like Connecticut's "IConn" project.

### **State Libraries**

State libraries hold and provide public access to records of a state's history and heritage, but some also have strong general research collections. The services and collections should be freely available, and the libraries may provide access to state residents to any number of licensed electronic databases.

Please refer to the section entitled “Find Your Local Libraries” to find your state libraries.

### **Local Colleges and Universities**

The libraries at state colleges and universities are often open to state residents, although access and use privileges vary. You should check with your nearby institutions to see what kind of resources are available. These collections tend to be more academic and research-oriented than those of state or public libraries.

Unless you are directly affiliated with a local college or university (faculty, student, staff, etc.), access is generally not permitted to licensed electronic databases, although there may be institutions that allow users who visit the library building to use such resources on-site. Other specialized services, such as interlibrary loan, may also be unavailable to you. Check with the library staff to find out exactly what services and resources you may use.

Please refer to the section entitled “Find Your Local Libraries” to find your local college and university libraries.

### **Interlibrary Loan Services**

If your local library collection does not house a resource you need, your public library's interlibrary loan service can help you borrow books from other institutions. Many libraries are members of regional and/or national consortia that share materials. Check with your local library to see what kinds of services are available. You must provide an accurate citation (author, title, publisher, and



publication date) for the item you want. In some communities, you may be able to place the interlibrary loan requests yourself by searching in the consortia's online catalog and submitting a request directly. The item will then be delivered to your local library for you to borrow. Please note that interlibrary loan services can take a few weeks to process.

### Online Electronic Resources

Access to all electronic resources depends upon the licenses that have been negotiated by the university. Alumni visiting the library in person are regarded as "walk-in" users and will be granted access to some of the electronic resources depending on license restrictions. Remote access to electronic resources is limited to those with a valid University computer service user name who



access the resources either from within the Oxford domain or via the Oxford “DialUp” service. For further information, see:

### Library Access and Privileges

Stanford alumni are entitled to seven days of free access in a 12-month period. In addition, members of the Stanford Alumni Association who present a membership card can get an additional seven courtesy days of access, or a total of 14 courtesy access days, in a 12-month period.

Alumni who desire borrowing privileges may purchase a borrowing card for three months at a cost of \$120 or for 12 months at a cost of \$300. A borrowing card grants access and borrowing privileges to all of the University Libraries. It will also be honored at the Coordinate Libraries, subject to their circulation policies. Alumni may borrow media materials for in-house use only (i.e., a three-hour borrowing period). The access policy is available online at:
